

PROCLAMATION.

BY

HIS EXCELLENCY SIR ALFRED MILNER, &c., &c.

No. 19, 1897.—DATED 30th DECEMBER, 1897.

WHEREAS it is expedient to remove doubt as to the meaning of the words "spirituous liquor" in the Proclamations of the High Commissioner referring to the Bechuanaland Protectorate, dated April 4th and September 23rd, 1892, and December 16th, 1897:

Now, therefore, under and by virtue of the powers in me vested, I do hereby proclaim, declare and make known as follows:—

Amendment of Proclamation of 4th April, 1892, and of the 16th December, 1897.

1. The words "intoxicating liquor as defined by the third section of the Liquor Licensing Act of the Cape Colony, No. 28 of 1883," shall be substituted for the words "wine, beer or spirituous or partly spirituous liquor," "wine, beer or spirituous liquor," and the word "liquor," wherever the said words respectively occur in the said Proclamation of April 4th, 1892, or in the first and third sections of the said Proclamation of December 16th, 1897.

Amendment of Proclamation of 23rd September, 1892.

2. The second section of the said Proclamation of September 23rd, 1892, is hereby amended so as to substitute for the definition of the term "liquor," therein set forth, the following: "intoxicating liquor as defined by the third section of the Liquor Licensing Act of the Cape Colony, No. 28 of 1883."

3. This Proclamation shall take effect from the date of its publication in the "Gazette."
